Unsung Heroes Mariners Move The Nation

Each year, in May, the nation celebrates the service of those whose efforts are often overlooked by the public at large. We are a maritime nation. And yet we pay scant attention to the contribution that are made on our behalf by the merchant mariners of the United States.

It was 90 years ago when the congress finally saw fit to commemorate the historic transatlantic crossing of the steamship Savannah by creating National Maritime Day as a tribute to the men and women of the Merchant Marine who power the world's largest economy in peace and, whenever necessary, support our armed forces with troops and supplies wherever they are needed.

In Baltimore, this year's ceremony took place on 21 May, at Pier 13 in Canton, on board the nuclear ship Savannah. Nearby was S.S. John W. Brown, one of only two fully operational survivors from the armada of Liberty Ships that were vital in securing victory in World War II.

Cruise News By The Dawn's Early Light

In truth it was well past dawn on Wednesday, 24 May, when the Coast Guard cutter/ buoy tender James Rankin (WLM-555) pulled away from her berth at Curtis Bay and headed out into Baltimore Harbor for the annual placement of the star-spangled Francis Scott buoy at the spot from which Key, on board a truce ship, witnessed the bombardment of Fort McHenry in September of 1814. It was then that he wrote the poem in four verses that became the lyrics of the National Anthem.

Captain (LT) Kyle Sutshek and her crew were busier than ever that morning. Not only did they have a mission to perform, the ship was crowded with passengers to witness the event. Spouses and friends of crewmembers, political and military guests of the Coast Guard, and members of a variety of military and patriotic organizations including this council which sponsors the ship and its personnel as an integral element of our mission. Leading the Navy League contingent was Council President Joe Nattans, along with V.P. Alan Walden, and Fr. Dan Bursi, the council chaplain. Nattans had, among his guests, Chief Warrant Officer Roger Weaver, USA-ret., who flew helicopters for Uncle Sam in Vietnam.

Among the elected officials on board was Hon. Kathy Szeliga, former minority whip of the Maryland House of Delegates and still a force to be reckoned with in Annapolis. And there

were flag officers of the Coast Guard on board as well.

The crowd was treated, by a National Park Service Ranger, to a brief overview of what had had happened by the dawn's early light. Then, as we reached the appointed spot near the Key Bridge, the Star-Spangled Banner was very well sung by the wife of one of the crew members, the buoy was slowly and carefully lifted from its cradle and lowered into the water while the crew lined the rail at attention and rendered their salute.

On the way back to Curtis Bay everyone on board was treated to a lavish and tasty lunch courtesy of the galley staff. And, as the James Rankin tied up at the pier, everyone, their appetites sated, their patriotism reinforced, seemed patently delighted to have been on board.

It is the most solemn day on the secular calendar; especially for the families and friends who will forever remember the sacrifice made by their fathers and mothers, sons and daughters, and friends, who died under the colors. Those who wore the uniforms of the Armed Forces of the United States in peace and war. So it was on Memorial Day, 29 May 2023 as an overflow crowd gathered again around the Circle of the Immortals at Dulaney Valley Memorial Gardens in Timonium to salute the fallen.

As he has for more than three decades, Baltimore Council Vice President Alan Walden was master of ceremony for an event that lasted well over two hours as tribute was paid with reverence and respect to the loved and lost. This council was well represented by its president, retired Brigadier General Joe Nattans who was accompanied by a prominent visitor from afar: Dr. Meen Poudyal Chhetri, president of the Center for Disaster Management in the Federal Democratic Republic of Nepal.

This year's event was a dual observance. First, in memory of all fallen heroes. Secondly, a National Remembrance of the 50th anniversary of the end of the 10,000 day War in Vietnam, the focus of many of the comments made by veterans of that conflict

and members of their families. Among the speakers was Hon. John Olszewski, Johnny "O", the Baltimore County Executive. And in the audience was Hon. Harry Bhandari, a member of the House of Delegates from the 8th Legislative District.

It was also the first time that Walden had a chance to see a bronze plaque affixed to the top of a wall at the Circle of Heroes in honor of his years of service to the ceremony.

We are ever grateful to John and Jack Mitchell, co-owners of Dulaney Valley Memorial Gardens, for they diligence and effort they provide in creating what is always a truly memorable event.
